

Fed. Tax Calendar For November, 1945

November 10—Withholding tax: Tax withheld from wages during October 1945, if more than \$100, payable to an authorized depository.

November 15—Corporate income and excess profits tax: Return due and one-fourth of tax payable for fiscal year ended August 31, 1945. One-fourth of tax payable for fiscal years ended November 30, 1944, and February 28 and May 31, 1945.

Personal income tax: Return due and tax payable for fiscal year ended August 31, 1945.

Nonresidents: Income tax returns of foreign partnerships due; foreign corporations' and aliens' returns due and one-fourth of tax payable for fiscal year ended August 31 and November 30, 1944 and February 28 and May 31, 1945.

Partnerships: Return due for fiscal year ended August 31, 1945.

Fiduciaries: Return due and one-fourth of tax payable for fiscal year ended August 31, 1945. One-fourth of tax payable for fiscal years ended November 30, 1944 and February 28 and May 31, 1945.

Escheat corporations: Information return on Form 990 due from certain exempt corporations with accounting periods ended June 30, 1945.

November 30—Excise taxes: Returns for October 1945 due and tax payable.

Ration Guide

SUGAR: War Ration Book IV Sugar Stamp No. 38, good for five pounds, will remain valid through December 31.

MEATS: War Ration Book IV Red Stamps F1, G1, H1, J1, K1 good through November 30. Stamps L1, M1, N1, P1 and Q1 good through December 31. Stamps R1, S1, T1, U1 and V1 good through January 31. Stamp W1, X1, Y1, Z1 and Green Stamp N5 become valid November 1 good through February 28.

RETAILERS ALLOW FOUR POINTS PER POUND FOR USED HOUSEHOLD FATS.

Effective October 22, 1945, every seller of a used consumer can under MPR 540 must fill out a certificate of transfer in duplicate within five days from date of sale. The original copy is to be filed at the local War Price and Rationing Board and the other copy is to be given to the purchaser. New certificates of transfer will be sent to the boards as soon as possible.
