53 Ration Boards Will be Closed In Nebraska Soon

The closing of 53 War Price & Rationing Boards in Nebraska by the first of the year was announced today by Loren N. Mills, Director of the Omaha District of the Office of Price Administration.

Consolidation of the state's 92 boards to 29 represents a change of emphasis in OPA's program from rationing to price control, Mr. Mills pointed out.

This reorganization of the OPA structure, Mr. Mills said, is in line with the agency's general policy to operate as economically as possible and still give the fullest service to the public.

"With most of rationing lifted, the necessity of large numbers of persons calling on Boards is eliminated. Fewer boards are needed to handle price control matters in Nebraska.

Locations of the new boards were determined on the basis of retail and service outlets with mail service and highway connections considered."

With the new set-up Mr. Mills said he expected that much of the new boards' business will be conducted by telephone and mail. Authorization for the change in the OPA program came from the Regional Office in Chicago.
