Cranberry Sauce with Sirup
Substitute 1 cup dark or light sirup for each 1 cup sugar up to half the sugar called for in recipe. Reduce liquid 3/4 cup for each 1 cup corn sirup used. Dark sirup gives a slight caramel flavor while the light variety tastes like sugar.

All-Sugar Recipe
2 c. sugar
2 c. water
4 c. cranberries
Part-Sugar Recipe
1 c. sugar
1 c. corn sirup
1 1/2 c. water
4 c. cranberries

Boil sugar, corn sirup and water together five minutes. Add cranberries, boil without stirring until all the skins pop open about five minutes. Remove from heat, cool in saucepan. Makes 1 quart.

The organized agriculture meetings will be held at the College of Agriculture at Lincoln on February 5 and 6, 1946. Many Cass

County Farm people usually attend these meetings and those interested are urged to circle the dates on their new calendar now.

Clinton Oats
Clinton Oats which has given outstanding yields in Iowa can not be recommended as superior to Cedar, which has given good results in Cass County. In tests conducted by the College of Agriculture at Lincoln the past two years, Clinton oat yielded Cedar one year and yielded less the other year during the two years it

has been tested. Clinton matured later than Cedar. Seed of Clinton is being distributed in Iowa for planting this coming spring, but Cass County farmers so far have been unsuccessful in attempts to obtain seed for 1946 planting. Those who want to get the new variety before further testing is done by the Experiment Station may be able to secure small quantities of seed following the 1946 harvest.
