

Mr. Truman called in members of the steel fact finding panel Monday to discuss the future conduct of their inquiry. This panel has not yet begun hearings on the wage demands of the nation's steel workers who walked out in the nation's biggest strike.

**Mrs. Milda Miller Dies Friday at Home in Enid, Oklahoma**  
Mrs. Milda A. Miller, 75, a former resident of Plattsmouth, died at the home of her son, John H. Miller, in Enid, Oklahoma, Friday.

Although she had been in her usual good health, she suffered a heart attack while eating breakfast and died a half hour later.

Milda Pollard Miller was born in Iowa on February 27, 1870. She was married April 17, 1888, to Bedford, Iowa, to Henry C. Miller who preceded her in death in 1916.

She lived in Plattsmouth, Mo., and Mrs. Miller came to make her home in the residence now owned by Mrs. Elizabeth Tritzsch. They were affiliated with the St. Paul's church while they lived here. In 1917 Mrs. Miller moved to Jamesport, Missouri to live on the family farm. She went to Emporia, Kansas to live in 1920 and to Enid, Oklahoma, in 1926 where she has since made her home with her son.

**Pittsburgh Area**  
In the Pittsburgh area, which supplies 30 per cent of the country's base steel ingot production, nearly 300 plants were closed. More than 200,000 workers were idle.

No attempt to operate were reported. Bethlehem Steel Corp. issued a statement "in the interest of preserving peace" which said it would make no attempt to produce steel and that picketing was unnecessary. However, lines were established at the company's Cambria works at Johnstown, Pa., at Bethlehem, Pa., and elsewhere.
