CHICAGO, (AP)—Little Miss Valentine said Thursday that she guessed just about everybody wanted her for their Valentine.

She had more than 32,000 Valentines to prove it. She is only 11 years old, but Evelyn Valentine has been an invalid for seven years. Most of the time she's been bedridden. Kind people throughout the country help her forget the pain of rheumatic fever every February 14 by sending her Valentines.

She said she received the 32,000 Valentines since she first became ill. This year she already has received several hundred. "They're nice," Evelyn said. "But I'd rather ride a bicycle." "The doctor says none of my friends can visit me. He said I'd have to forget about school for a while, too. All I have is my Valentines."

Evelyn, blonde and chubby, said she hoped she would be able to go to school next year. She was to have started last Valentine's Day, but she got sick again and couldn't go.

"I finally got to go one semester, but now I'm back in bed again," she said.

Sitting up in bed surrounded by Valentines and unopened letters, Evelyn said she never could answer all her mail. Her mother, Mrs. Ruth Valentine, said she had tried to help, but that the letters kept coming in too fast to answer.

"Valentine's Day is my own day," Evelyn said. "Sometimes I wish I'd been born on that day, but then I'd only get one celebration. This way I get two."

Evelyn said she had been invited to a party today but the doctor wouldn't let her go.

"He wouldn't even let me have a party of my own," she said. "I guess I'll just have to celebrate myself, looking at my cards."
