Additional Evidence Uncovered in Canada

OTTAWA, (UP)—The "serious nature" of disclosures of secret information to Russian agents has been confirmed by "additional evidence" placed before the royal commission investigating the leakage, a report by counsel for the commission said Saturday.

Louis St. Laurent, justice minister, released the report after consultations with Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King.

Specifying that 11 men and two women are in federal custody for interrogation in connection with the leakage of official secrets, the report said that additional persons may have to be questioned.

CHICAGO (UP)—The daughter of a former candidate for mayor of Chicago was raped in an auto at gun point and raped early Sunday.

Miss Ellen McKibbin, 18, said the driver, who told her his name was Jack Fitzgerald, approached her on a south side street, branched a gun and forced her into the car. She said he attacked her in an alley about a mile away.

The girl told police that she had been drinking earlier at several south side taverns with a friend. Six bartenders and tavern owners are under arrest on charges of collusion to honor a minor on complaint of the girl.

Miss McKibbin's father, George B. McKibbin, was defeated by Edward J. Kelly for mayor of Chicago in 1943.

inflation would burst with disastrous violence if price controls were not continued. He also expressed belief that production would increase sufficiently to permit removal of all but rent controls by June 30, 1947, the expiration date in the extension bill.

Kaiser Invited
The committee invited industrialist Henry J. Kaiser to testify Tuesday but his reply had not been received at the start of hearings Monday. Reconversion Director John W. Snyder and Civilian Production Administration Director John Small are scheduled to testify on Wednesday.

There appeared little doubt that some kind of measure extending price control would emerge from the committee. However, some members believe that the present bill should be modified. Republican members plan an amendment which would give greater weight to recommendations by OPA industry advisory committees on the elimination or relaxation of controls.
