# Wheatless Diet for U. S. Urged Until Food Shortage Over

CHICAGO (AP)—Dr. Anton J. Carlson Thursday advocated a wheatless diet for every American until the European food shortage is relieved.

Carlson, professor emeritus of physiology at the University of Chicago and a dietary authority, said that people could do without wheat permanently without suffering ill effects.

"Our whole economy is built around a diet including wheat products, but we could do without them," he said.

"Wheat isn't really necessary. The American Indians didn't have it until the white men came. Eskimos, Scandinavians and some Russians don't have it, and they are getting along all right."

reached, Krug expected another industry-wide strike in coal fields unless Lewis asks the miners to continue working without a contract.

Thus far Lewis has given no indication whether he would order an extension of the current truce, which ended a six-week walkout of the 400,000 bituminous miners. Even if he ordered an extension, the wildcat strikes during the truce indicated that thousands of miners would ignore Lewis' action; their traditional slogan has been "no contract, no work."

Preliminary reports received by the solid fuels administration showed 243 mines were closed yesterday during the first day of government operation.
