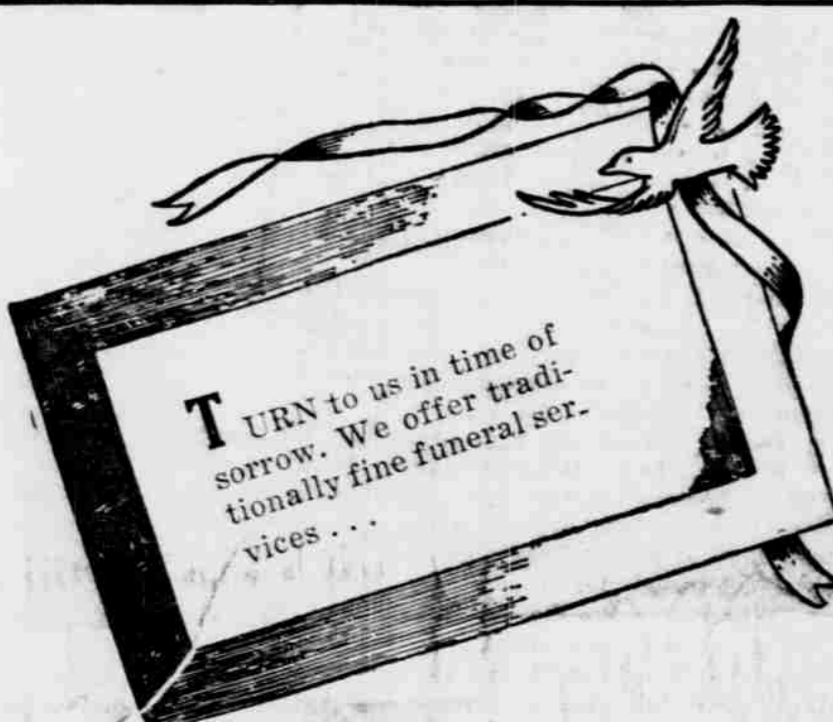

Appointments to Service Schools To Be Made for '47

Howard Buffett, congressman, second congressional district, announces that he will have one appointment to the military academy at West Point and one appointment to the naval academy at Annapolis for the year beginning July 1, 1947.

These appointments will be made from the high qualifiers on a civil service examination to be given Wednesday, July 24, 1946. The examination will be given at the various first and second class post offices in the district.

The boys selected must be legal residents of the second congressional district of Nebraska. They must not be less than 5 feet, 6 inches in height.

Candidates for the military academy must be between the ages of 17 and 22 years, except for any candidate who has served honorably not less than one year in the armed forces who may be admitted between the ages of 18 and 24.

Candidates for the naval academy must be between the ages of 17 and 21, except for those having served honorably not less than one year in the armed forces, who may be admitted between the ages of 17 and 23.

Boys wishing to attend West Point or Annapolis, who have not indicated their desire to the congressman, should write to Howard Buffett, 457 House Office building, Washington, D. C. Applications to take the examination must be made by July 1.

Oregon Plans to Reforest 300,000 Burned-out Acres

TILLAMOOK, Ore. (U.P.)—A 10-year program to reforest 300,000 acres laid waste here last year by one of the most disastrous fires in northwest history has been outlined by the Oregon state forestry board.

The fire baffled the efforts of 3,000 men to stop it, roared through more than 40 square miles of the nation's finest old growth timber, killed three persons and left a graveyard of rotting stumps, black tree skeletons and a wild confusion of debris that rivaled any battlefield.

The rehabilitation program, The city of Cincinnati, O., owns the Cincinnati, New Orleans and Texas Pacific railway, connecting Cincinnati with Chattanooga Tenn., operated under lease by the Southern Railway system.
