## Oregon Plans to Reforest 300,000 Burned-out Acres

TILLAMOOK, Ore. (U.P.) A 10-year program to reforest 300,-000 acres laid waste here last year by one of the most disastrous fires in northwest history has been outlined by the Oregon state forest-

The fire baffled the efforts of 3,000 men to stop it, roared through more than 40 square miles of the nation's finest old growth timber, killed three persons and left a graveyard of rotting stumps, black tree skeletons and a wild confusion of debris that rivaled any battlefield.
