



But troubles came the following spring. Ice in the Platte river was 212 to 3 feet thick, Heavy, wet shows and continuous rains swelled the river to a depth of 35 feet. The ice would not break up and Pollock became worried. He gained permission to fasten cables from the Burlington railroad bridge to his bridge. The Burlington bridge had wider spans so the ice could pass under the bridge without breaking up, but Pollock's bridge was shorter-spanned and the ice piled up against it.

The inevitable happened and the bridge was shoved several feet downstream by the heavy ice. Undaunted, Pollock repaired the bridge and from then on the toll business flourished until he sold the bridge to an engineer after 15 years as its owner. The engineer wrecked it and the state soon created a bridge slightly east of the location of the Pollock bridge Following his bridge venture, Pollock re-entered the banking business when he became associat ed with the Farmers State bank here. The depression of the late 1920's and early 1930's struck the bank as it did others. The result was that Pollock personally paid depositors \$64,058 of his own personal funds to make all de-


