Alfalfa, red clover, sweet clover and alsike clover seeds are freed from price ceiling. The OPA and the AAA operate separately. The farmer may sell his seeds in the open field of competition or to the buyer who pays the most, he will continue to receive the incentive or benefit payments of 7 cents per pound on alfalfa seed and 9 cents per pound on red clover seed. These payments good until January 1, 1947.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—Emil Hurja, who gained quite a reputation as a political seer back in the days when Jim Farley was running things, has stuck out his neck again. This time it's with a list of the 26 congressional seats it will be easiest for the Republicans to win in the coming election.

Twenty-six is, of course, the magic number which the GOP must win to get control of the House. Any gains above 26 are just political gravy. There are not a few surprises in Emil's lineup. Among the Democratic stalwarts whom Hurja says are riding for a fall he includes Mrs. Chase Going Woodhouse of Connecticut, Mrs. Emily Taft Douglas of Chicago, Louis Ludlow of Indianapolis, Frank E. Hook of Ironwood, Mich., Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee Clarence Cannon of Missouri, Hugh De Lacy and Charles Savage of Washington state.

Almost all those on the death list have been active in labor affairs, leaders in advocacy of the Roosevelt-Truman program for liberal legislation. That's indicative of the swing.
