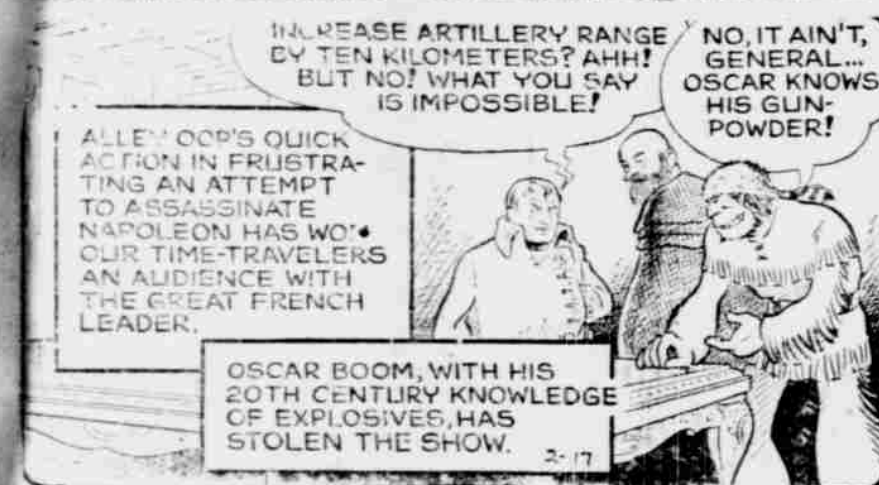
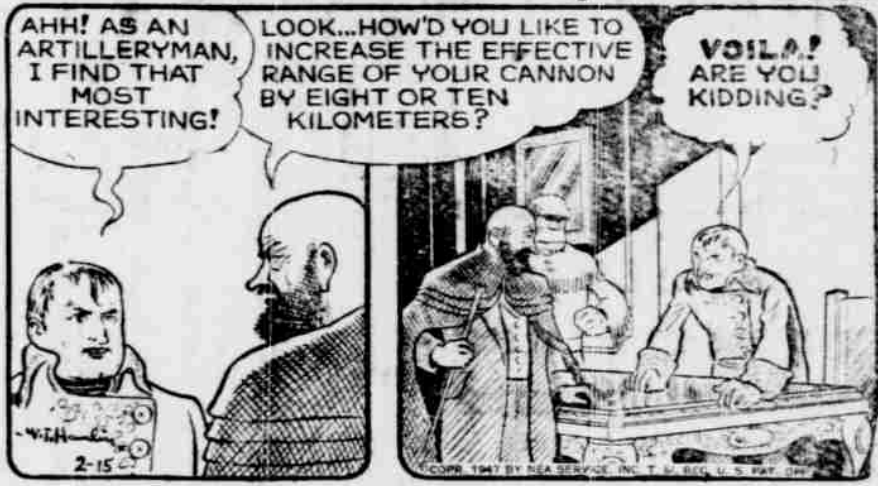

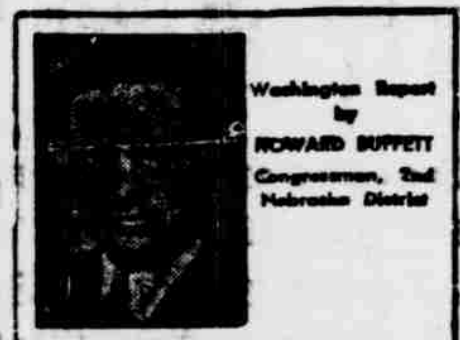

Washington Report by HOWARD BUFFETT, Congressman, 3rd Nebraska District

One year ago this month Congressional hearings began for continuing the OPA. Spurred by a gigantic propaganda drive, the peacetime OPA was continued by Congress. But today OPA, except for a narrow sector of our economy, is dead. Why?

The regimentation of OPA did not end because the Administration was willing. Nor did it end because the Congress had the courage to remove these economic shackles. OPA ended because the American people aroused to patriotic resistance, put it out of business.

Freedom's great victory in 1946 was the death of OPA. It is impossible to over-estimate the importance of this achievement. Historically most price control schemes have ended in social disorder and bloodshed, but the American people eliminated OPA without such episodes. And it must be remembered that the people, not officialdom, got the job done.
