What the Law Says About Selecting Beer Retailers

Licenses will soon be issued to the tavern-keepers who will operate in your town next year. The law covering the selection of these operators provides ample safeguards against the licensing of the unworthy.

The law specifies that the local governing bodies of cities and villages have the right to examine, under oath, any applicant for a retail license or renewal. The board may authorize its agent or attorney to act in obtaining any desired information.

Further, the law provides that the local governing body must consider any signed complaint from any citizen of a violation of the law or any objectionable conduct on the part of an applicant. A license may be revoked, or a new license refused if there is cause.

This Committee urges the co-operation of every citizen in bringing law violations to the attention of licensing bodies.
