Services For Louis Reinacke; Burial Horning

Death claimed a Plattsmouth pioneer Friday, June 27, in Omaha, when Louis Reinacke, 79, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Muri Forker, 4017 South street. Mr. Reinacke had been in good health and had been up and around on Thursday, the day before his death.

Mr. Reinacke was born November 6, 1867 in Plattsmouth, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Reinacke and had made his home here and near Plattsmouth all his life.

In 1898 he enlisted in the Third Nebraska Infantry for service in the Spanish-American war under Col. William Jennings Bryan. A member of Co. B, composed entirely of Cass County men, his commanding officer was Capt. George L. Sheldon. Mr. Reinacke was a member of Spanish-American War Veterans, Lee Corley Post, Omaha.

Mr. Reinacke worked for 20 years in the Burlington shops. He then moved to a farm near Murray where he farmed for 20 years.

After retiring from the farm Mr. and Mrs. Reinacke moved to Plattsmouth where they lived until the death of Mrs. Reinacke three years ago. Since then he has lived with his daughter in Omaha.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Forker, and Mrs. E. C. Ferris, Omaha; two stepsons, Earl Lindner of Plattsmouth and Will Lindner of San Pedro, California; a sister, Mrs. Laura Keeler, Longview, Wash., and a brother, August Reinacke, Spokane, Wash.
