Did you laugh when you read that Russian soldiers were pay-

G. I.'s \$200 or more for \$5 Mickey Mouse watches—or similar fantastic prices for other trinkets? Did you think the Russian soldier was a dumb cluck, getting trimmed on the deal? If so, get ready to laugh out of the corner of your mouth.

Somehow or other I feel like sort of an old meanie in exploding this illusion. But if you are not yet familiar with what really happened, you should know. I imagine that when it isn't your fault that you have been trim-

med, you at least want to know why and how. I can't tell you why, but I can tell you how you got rooked in this deal.

In 1944, our military was getting ready to invade Europe. So that our soldiers would have money printed in language and denominations understandable in Germany, an artificial money called Allied Military Currency was printed in Washington. The idea was that our soldiers would use it in Germany just as a tourist in France used French francs. Later G. I.'s could turn in this currency to the army paymaster for genuine American dollars.

An amount of this artificial currency sufficient to supply our army was printed. Then a strange thing happened. The engraving plates and equipment used to print this synthetic money was turned over to the Russians.

Moreover, if I heard arieh in a Senate hearing recently, Washington was even more generous. The Russians were given substantial quantities of this special ink and paper for printing quantities of this currency. Being especially adept at printing phony money, the Russians printed colossal quantities of this currency. Then they payrolled their troops in Germany with this American originated currency.

Also they instructed their troops to spend this currency in Germany. This currency, being similar to our military currency, was readily accepted by our G. I.'s—who got fabulous amounts of it for small goods. The G. I. in turn redeemed this Russian-printed but American-blessed currency for real American dollars.

If the army can keep it secret, you will never know. home states of the offending parties. Total fines, costs, and liquidated damages resulting from game law violations during June amounted to \$358.00. Apparently it pays to practice conservation, if only through the observance of game laws.

Nebraska wild game is going to have a place to live during the next few years if the Nebraska Game Commission can do anything about it. A 32-county area, practically one-fourth of the total area of the state, will see an intensified program of upland game habitat restoration which will put Nebraska far out in front of any state in the country in this type of work.

The region to be developed extends to the east and south, roughly, from a line drawn from Elwood to Fairbury, thence northeast to the western boundary of Knox county.

Present plans call for an expenditure of \$220,000 during the next three years, with an annual planting of between 300,000 and 400,000 trees.

Persons interested in Nebraska's wildlife may now hear one of their favorite subjects discussed on the air. The state Game Commission now has a weekly 15-minute radio program entitled "Outdoor Nebraska," which may be heard from the following stations: KOLT and KOKY at Scottsbluff; KOPY at North Platte; KGFV, Kearney; KHAS at Hastings; KORN, Fremont; WJAG, Norfolk; KFOR, Lincoln; and KOLA, Omaha. If present plans materialize, the program will be carried on stations KBON, and KOAD, in Omaha, and KOLN in Lincoln.
