

Masonic Rites At Funeral Of Oliver C. Dovey

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning in the Sattler funeral home for Oliver C. Dovey, 80, who died Friday night, August 8 at his home.

The Masonic service was read at both the funeral home and the graveside. Raymond Cook, deputy grand nechanid of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, gave the oration and officiated at the ceremonies.

Frank Cloldt sang two hymns, "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere", with Mrs. Verma Goos accompanying.

Burial was in Oak Hill cemetery.

Mr. Dovey was active in the Masonic lodge. In October, 1904 he received the degrees in Platts-mouth Lodge No. 6. The following spring, May, 1905 he received the degrees in Nebraska Chapter No. 3, Royal Arch Masons. In November of that year he completed the requirements for Mount Zion Commandery No. 5.

Serving as master of lodge No. 6 from 1908 to 1911, he again filled that office from 1914 to 1917. He was also high priest of Nebraska Chapter No. 3 during 1908 and 1909. He belonged to the Knights Templar.

Friends recall that Mr. Dovey had a wonderful memory and that he was often called on for affidavits. He took a keen interest in everything pertaining to civic and world affairs.

A veteran merchant of Platts-mouth, Mr. Dovey retired from active life many years ago and lived at the family home with Mrs. Dovey who survives. The Dovey home was built on the same lot on which his parents established their home upon coming to this city in 1863. The location at 404 North Sixth street served as Mr. Dovey's address during his entire lifetime in this city.

Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Claire Brown of Lakewood, Ohio, Miss Hazel Dovey of Platts-mouth and Canton, Ohio, two granddaughters and two great grandsons.

A considerable amount of remodeling has already been completed in the local homemaking department during the year in order that it meet the standards of the State Department. As soon as facilities permit, activities in adult homemaking will be offered to interested homemakers.
