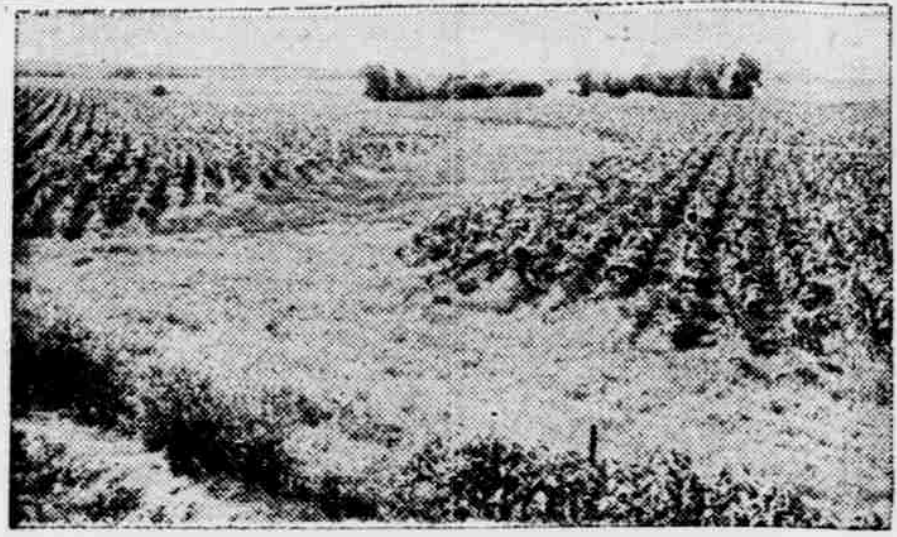

Newcastle Disease Vaccination Still Experimental
Vaccination for Newcastle disease, today's fastest-spreading threat to American poultry flocks, is still in the experimental stage. That was the warning sounded by a committee of the American Veterinary Medical Association at the annual convention of the organization this week.

The Association committee on biological products was not ready to accept this vaccination at the present time according to the report of the group. Current efforts to develop a more efficient vaccine may prove fruitful but further evidence is needed to show that the vaccine furnishes adequate protection under field conditions during an epidemic of Newcastle disease.
