Old Missouri Mule Yielding Throne

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Missouri mule has joined the old gray mare on a growing list of things that ain't what they used to be.

The subject came to light when the U. S. Department of Commerce published a book listing the ranking agricultural counties of the country. For the first time in history, not a single Missouri county was listed among the 50 leading counties in terms of number of mules and mule colts.

Missouri, known throughout the world for its sturdy mules, has been slipping for many years in this category. In 1910, the Show Me state ranked second only to Texas in the number of mules on farms. By 1940, however, Missouri had dropped to ninth place, and to day is out of the running.

While Missouri mules have been disappearing, the North Carolina mule has been increasing in number, the report shows.

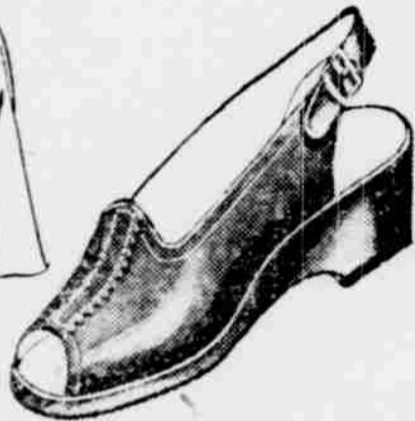
The principal reason for the decline of the Missouri mule, a veteran of both World Wars, seems to be the rapid increase in mechanization of farms.
