She came as a bride to the North Branch community in Otoe County, where Mr. Harmer owned a farm, and where all of her seven children were born.

At the time she came to Otoe County bands of roving Indians camped very frequently on their farms, which was located on the North Branch of the Nemaha River. They would come to her home and beg for food, which she frequently gave them. Her home was known as a place of friendliness and good will. It was a mecca for people who sought the companionship of honest pioneer folks, whose generous hearts pulsated in sympathetic understanding of all the varied problems which effect human relationships, especially in a pioneer community.

Mrs. Harmer will be remembered as a loving and devoted mother whose whole life was given over to the happiness and welfare of others. She believed that "it is more blessed to give than to receive," and it was that philosophy of life that endeared her to all whose privilege it was to know her. She was one of the early pioneers of eastern Nebraska who faced the trials and hardships with other courageous settlers, fighting and battling the many obstacles and in the end conquering them that we might today enjoy the many conveniences and comforts of modern day civilization.
