Mr. and Mrs. Roy Frans and Jim were visiting at the Gilmeos Sunday afternoon.

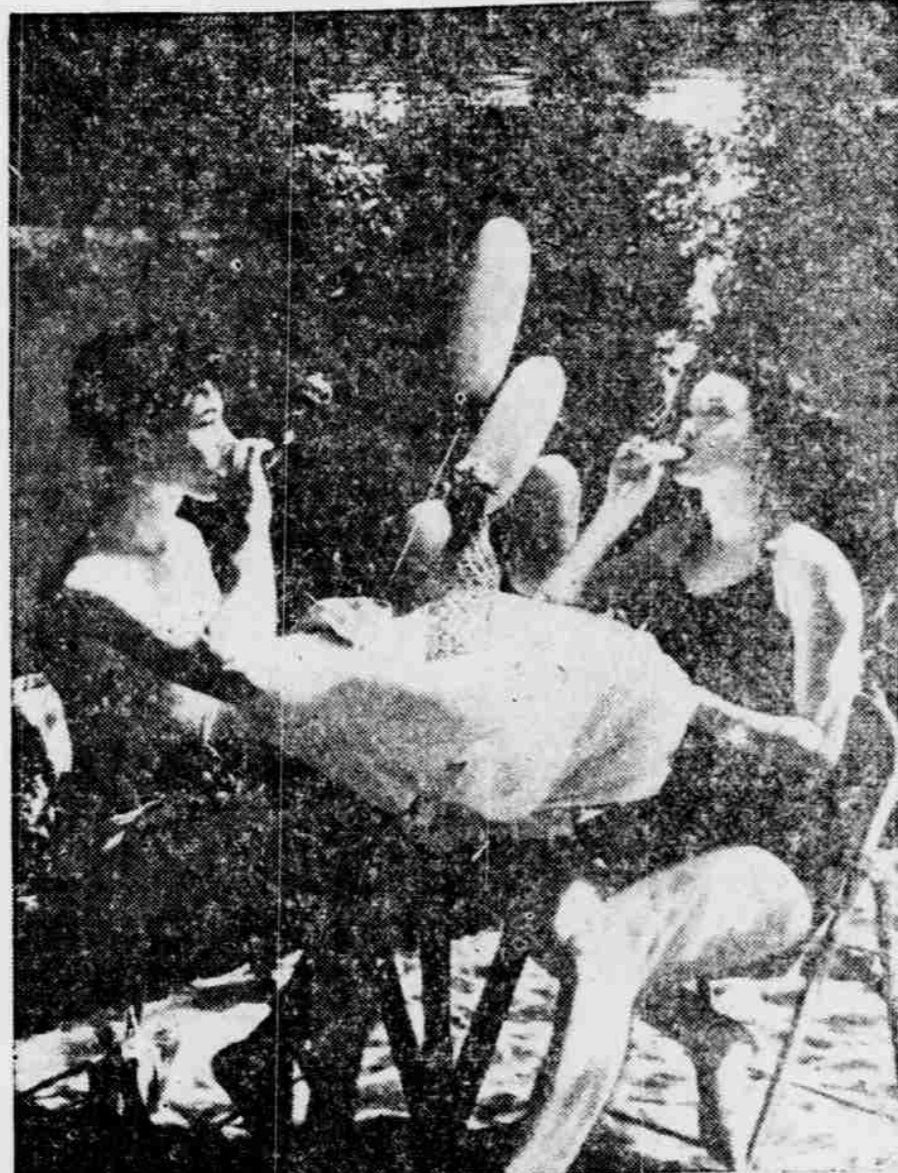

Record \$40 Price on Cattle in Omaha

Omaha's world record fat cattle price of \$40.00, set Tuesday last week, continued to be the quotable top there Monday despite uneven trade that hit some "new croppers," especially heifers, as much as 50 cents. Best steers at Omaha Monday, however, were \$38.50, with 1025 pounders equalling the all-time high for that weight, \$38.00. Fed heifers sold to \$30.00 and were quotable to \$33.00 or better.

Cows added at least another quarter to last week's gains, clearing canners and cutters at \$13.25 to \$15.50, and lifting the top for beef cows to \$22.50. Bulls sold to \$21.50. Stockers and feeders were 25c up, stock steers to \$26.00, feeder steers to \$26.50. Stock calves were 50c-\$1.00 higher, steer calves to \$29.50, heifer calves to \$27.00, the latter a new all-time high. On heavier supply hogs slumped 50-75c, dropping the top from \$28.75 Friday (highest since October), to \$28.00 Monday. Sows sold to \$26.00. Fat lambs, up last week, sold strong to 25 cents or more up Monday, the top \$25.35 and quotable higher or at the highest level since September. Slaughter ewes, to \$10.00, were steady; likewise feeder lambs considered eligible to \$22.50.
