



After harvest it makes a fine green manure crop as well as allowing you to plow under most weeds before they have seeded. The decay of this vegetation makes a fine booster for fall wheat or any legume crop which you may plant.

All sweet corn seed, in the past few years has been developed into a hybrid seed, and will produce a good stand and yield under normal conditions. All seed is graded and as a rule can be planted with regular corn plates.
