

Livestock Values in Varied Pattern at Omaha Market

Livestock values followed a varied pattern trend Monday on the Omaha market. Most fat cattle, especially better kinds—those from \$27.00 up—were lower, and fat lambs slumped a quarter but hogs rallied to recover 50 cents to a dollar of Friday's sharp break and slaughter ewes vaulted to still another new 28-year high, \$13.50. Slaughter steers, yearlings and heifers sold unevenly weak to 50¢ off, steers quotable to above \$37.00 but top sale Monday \$33.00. Highest heifers were \$23.00. Canner and cutter cows sold strong, most sales \$16.00-\$17.25, but beef cows were short of last week's best trade by 50¢-\$1.00, too \$22.00. Beef bulls also hit \$22.00. Stockers and feeders were steady to weak at \$20.00-\$26.50, quotable peak \$29.00. Hogs, \$10.00-\$15.00 lower Friday, rallied Monday for a 50¢-\$1.00 advance, clearing butchers at \$24.75 to \$26.50 and sows at \$23.00 to \$23.50. A quarter break sliced the fat lamb top to \$24.75 but killer ewes gained

a quarter and a \$13.50 top, highest since May, 1920. Feeder lambs, strong, sold at \$22.50-\$23.25.
