Dr. O. E. Liston took a few days vacation at his sister's home, Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds, at Lane, Kansas.

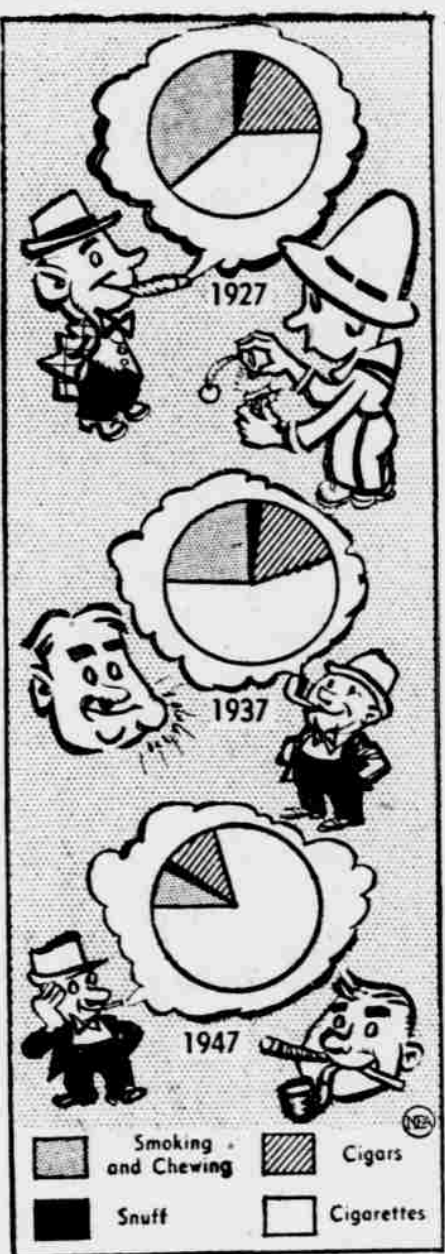
Mrs. Amos March visited her mother, Mrs. Laura Sutherland, a few days last week.
