Relatives here received word of the birth of a son, Larry Duwain, to Mr. and Mrs. Duwain, of Hardin, Montana, on Friday, February 20th.

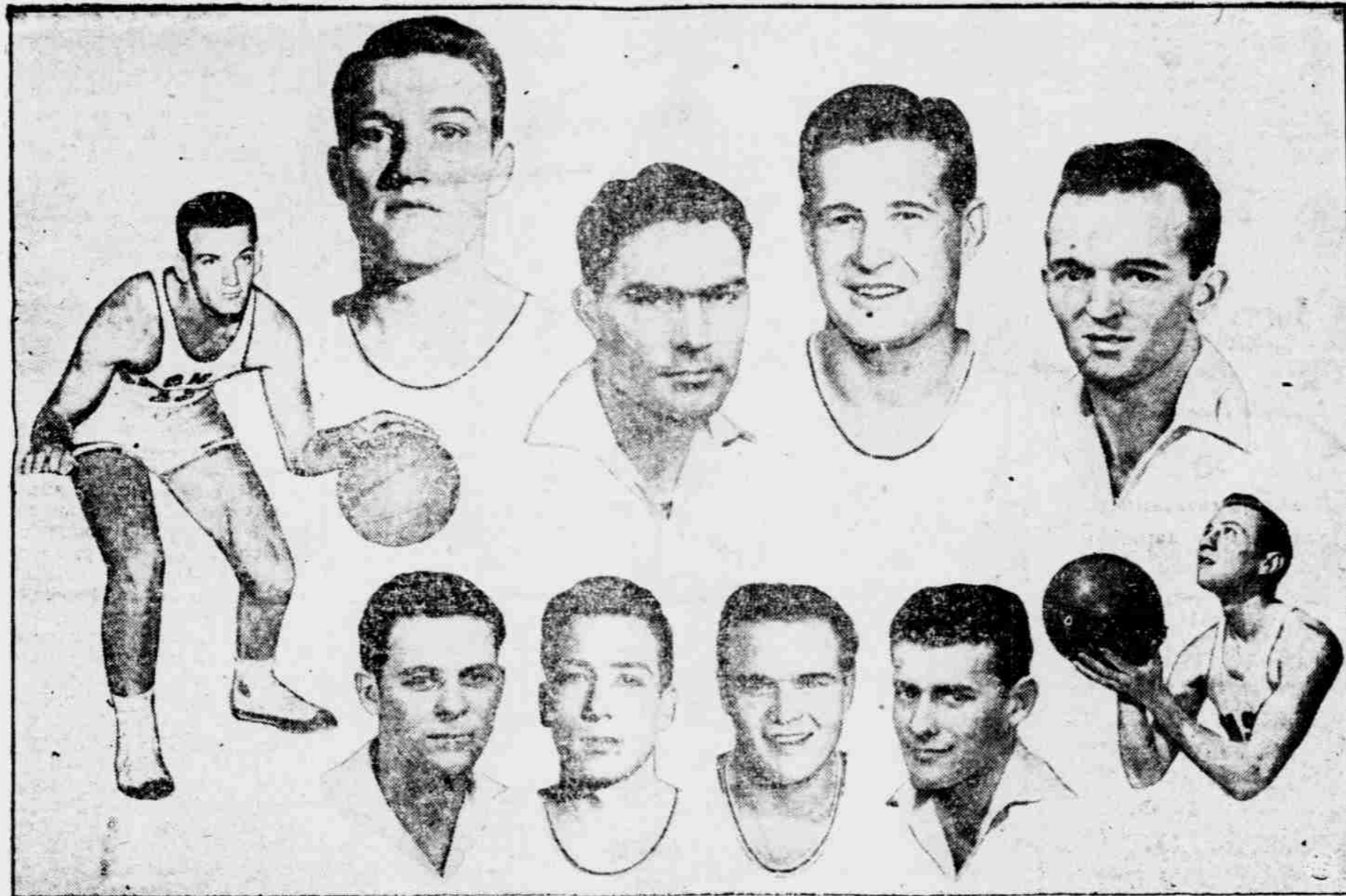
Chapter P. E. O. met on Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. George Corley.
