Ruth Patton and Alice Jayne Grosshans were appointed to be in charge of this project.

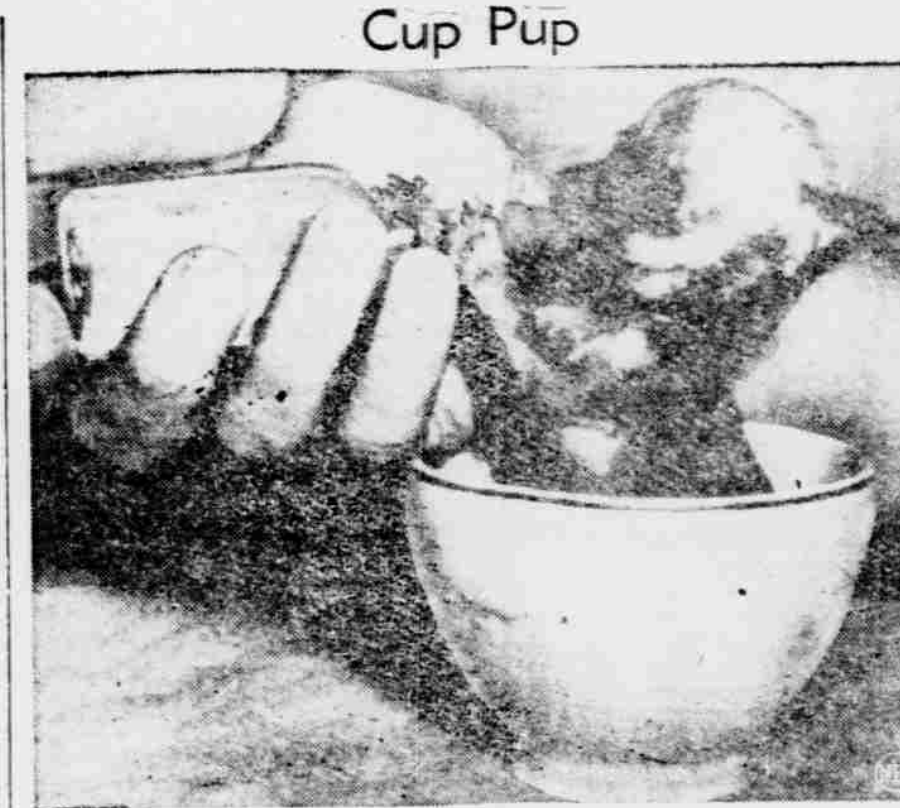
