Report Shooting of Song Birds

There have been reports of the shooting of song birds by some boys in Plattsmouth. These children and their parents perhaps do not realize there is a state law forbidding this and making them subject to fine.

The Game, Fish and Park Laws of the state of Nebraska in Article III, section 8, on open seasons, state: "It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot, kill, destroy, or catch, or attempt to shoot, kill, destroy, or catch, or have in possession living or dead any song, insectivorous, or nongame bird, or part of such bird, other than English sparrow, blue jay, crow, Cooper's hawk. Anyone who shall in violation of this act kill, take or destroy any song or insectivorous bird or destroy or take the eggs or nest of any such bird shall be fined \$15.00 for each offense."

There are never so many song birds that we can afford to kill them, if only from an economic viewpoint. Birds are our most efficient protection from insect pests.
