As of June 3, with sightly over one month completed 31 fatalities are already recorded.

During 1947, of the 153 persons who lost their lives in Nebraska, 34 or 22 percent were foreign motorists. This will mean that during the coming summer at least 21 persons who die will have been guests in the state.

"We are calling upon the drivers in Nebraska to use extreme caution during the coming vacation months. Exercise patience, courtesy, good defensive driving tactics and you will stay out of trouble.
