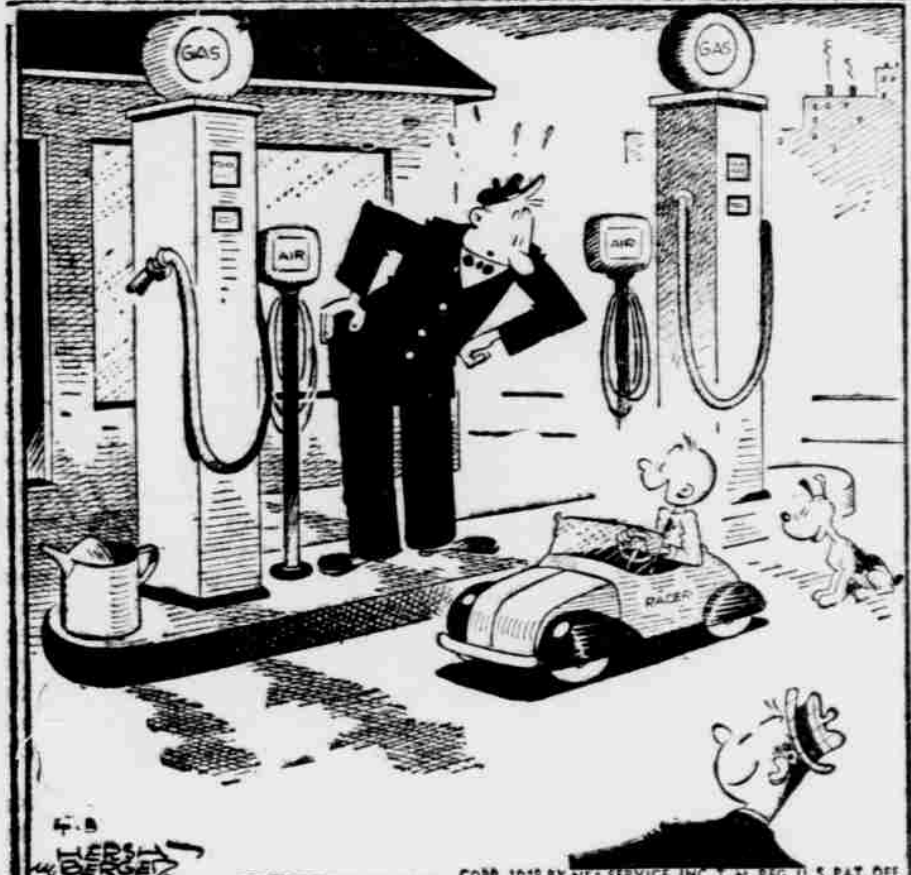

Local People at Church Conference
Park College, Parkville, Mo., was host during the week of June 22-25, to a conference of more than a hundred fifty leaders of the Women's Guild of the Evangelical and Reformed Church from various parts of the country, especially the middle west.
Working under the general program theme "One in the Bond of Peace" the delegates devoted themselves in a four day session to a study of the areas where Christian women can work for world peace. Study groups on "China in the Asia of Today," "America's Geographical Frontiers," "Christian Leadership," "Christian Citizenship," "Program Building" and "Worship Methods," were taught by recognized leaders in the denomination. Of special interest was a workshop on the use of audiovisual aids in building programs in a women's organization.
Dr. John Biegleisen, professor of New Testament at Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis was the leader of the assembly, and Dr. David D. Baker, editor of THE MESSENGER, the denominational paper, also of St. Louis, gave the main address on the relief and rehabilitation needs of the world. Two relief projects for 1949 were headlined for the women of the Evangelical and Reformed Church—the providing of 10,000 layetts for newborn babies overseas and the donation of embroidery floss and bright colored wool for the use of Hungarian women who earn their living by doing peasant embroidery and who have been unable to obtain the needed materials.

"Sniper" Story Vivid to Two Local Ladies

The publication of the story of the capture of Frank Carter, better known as the "Sniper," recalls very vividly to two Plattsmouth ladies the thrilling incidents when this slayer of several Omaha parties was captured at Bartlett, Iowa, without a shot fired and returned to Omaha.
This story was featured in the World-Herald as one of the big news stories in the history of the paper and its publication brought memories to the local ladies, Mrs. Ward Schade and Mrs. Estil Jenkins, of Washington's birthday in 1926, when the much sought man was captured. C. C. Bruce, a section foreman for the Burlington road his handcar near Bartlett, Iowa. He saw a man walking the track, who wore a cap and leather jacket and the description fitted the much sought "sniper" that Omaha police had searched for many days.
Mr. Bruce went on into Bartlett, found Constable David Morgan, who was the father of the now Mrs. Estil Jenkins and a cousin of Mrs. Schade. They decided he was the "sniper." They then secured the assistance of Noel Staples and Milo Aitken, a brother of Mrs. Schade, the party then started back up the track on the hand car.
They passed the man, pretending not to look at him, then stopped. Constable Morgan held a gun on the man and ordered: "Hold up your hands." The man smiled, but made no move with his hands. The others cautiously closed in on him and grabbed his arms. He made no resistance. They tied him with rope.
"You look like the Sniper," said Morgan.
"I am," the man said.
Boastfully, he went on: "You'd never have got me if I could have got my gun. It's here under my shirts. I didn't have time to unbutton them." He was four.
On the hot morning of June 24, 1927, Carter greeted reporters in the death house at the Nebraska Penitentiary. He was in good humor and wanted to talk about the murders.
The chaplain said, "We commit the soul of Frank Carter into Thy hands, O Lord."
The Sniper interrupted: "Better make that Pat Murphy, chaplain. That's my real name."
Carter got into the chair. The straps were adjusted. A heavy leather mask was put over his face.
Muffled, his voice was heard. He was impatient. "Well, turn on the juice."
The executioner threw the switch.
