He was one of 7 Senators who voted against participation in United Nations Organizations. Proof—Congressional Record, page 11,590, December 4, 1944.
He was one of 10 Senators who voted against the peace treaty with Italy. Proof—Congressional Record, page 6,567, June 5, 1947.
Voted against an amendment to extend farm price supports of 90 percent without reduction through 1949. Proof—Congressional record, page 8,864, June 17, 1948.
Voted for the new Aiken farm act which reduces farm price supports down to 60 percent of parity. Proof—Congressional Record, page 8,878, June 17, 1948.
Voted against increasing soil conservation assistance. Proof—Congressional Record, pages 6,439 and 6,492, May 24, 1948.
He was one of six Senators who voted against raising the minimum wage rate from 40 cents to 60 cents an hour. Proof—Congressional Record, page 3155, April 4, 1946.
He was one of 10 Senators who voted against the full employment bill. Proof—Congressional Record, page 9,305, Sept. 26, 1948.
He voted against raising the basic pay in the Armed Forces \$25.00 a month. Proof—Congressional Record, Sept. 26, 1945.
He voted against extending jobless benefits. Proof—Congressional Record, page 8,972, Sept. 20, 1945.
He voted against raising Old Age Pensions \$21.00 a month to compensate for present high costs of living. Proof—Congressional Record, page 2,807, March 13, 1948.
He was one of 14 Senators who voted against the Veterans Emergency Housing Bill. Proof—Congressional Record, page 3,502, April 10, 1948.
He voted against restoring Corporation Excess Profits Taxes. Proof—Congressional Record, page 3,249, March 19, 1948.
He introduced and voted for a bill to ease excess profits taxes on corporations by raising tax exemption from 10 to \$20,000. Proof—Congressional Record, page 7,928, July 19, 1948.
He took the credit for killing price control.
He voted to increase rents 15 percent. Proof—Congressional Record, page 8,748, July 11, 1946.
He voted to reduce farm price supports. Proof—Congressional Record, page 8,878, June 17, 1948.
He voted against Federal Aid to Education by voting to recommit the bill to the committee. Proof—Congressional Record, page 8,570, October 20, 1943.
He again voted against Federal Aid to Education. Proof—Congressional Record, page 4,059, April 1, 1948.
He voted to cut school lunch funds in half by voting for another amendment offered by Senator Taft. Proof—Congressional Record, page 1,661, Feb. 26, '46.

HERE IS YOUR PRESENT REPUBLICAN CONGRESSMAN'S RECORD

On March 4, 1947, he voted against a bill to extend the farm labor supply program to Dec. 31. It passed, 243 to 110, with most Republicans favoring it.
On May 28 he helped to defeat an attempt to restore \$165,000,000 in farm funds to the agricultural bill. It lost by six votes. On June 16 he helped defeat the wool protection bill in the same manner.
On Feb. 14, 1948, he helped defeat an appropriation for 300 million dollars for rural electrification.
He has shown his dislike for Missouri river development and on several occasions has voted against appropriations for development of various river basins.
In the 79th Congress, Buffett was one of 16 congressmen, including only six Republicans, who voted against reviving federal crop insurance. There were 255 favorable votes.
On May 1, 1947, he voted with Marconantonio against the rent control bill, which was passed in an avalanche of GOP votes.
On March 16, 1948, he voted against the Republicans rent control extension bill.
On June 18, he voted against the standby selective service bill introduced by the GOP. It passed 282 to 131.
He was practically a "lone wolf" in voting against the Wolcott housing bill, a diluted version of the original Taft-Ellender-Wagner measure fostered by the American Legion. It passed 318 to 9, with only Buffett and two other Republicans opposing it.
On June 19 he voted against the selective service bill, which passed, 259 to 136. This bill also was approved by the Republican high command.
Buffett's veteran votes in the 79th Congress appear to be just as uniformly against the ex-service man and against the best interests of the American Legion.
Buffett was opposed to the policies of Presidential Candidate Dewey four years ago—and is OPPOSED TO THEM TODAY!
His past voting record shows that he was opposed to the major planks of the Republican platform in 1944—and he states publicly he hasn't changed his mind! He has bolted his party on all important issues.
Buffett has not voted in the best interests of this district; he has voted in the best interests of the isolationists and "away from home" interests.
