



Proposed by Initiative Petition 300 TYES AN ACT relating to veterans of World War II;

providing for compensation and terms of eligibility of Nebraska residents who served in the Armed

Forces of the United States within certain periods of World War II; providing for the administration of this act, defining terms, and creating the veteran's compensation fund; authorizing the Department of Veteran's Affairs to establish rules and regulations; providing for a three and onehalf mill levy upon all taxable property of the State, except intangible property, for the years 1949 to 1953, inclusive; and to

provide penalties.
