Sample Ballot Non-Political

Special Election November 2, 1948

"Shall the Board of County Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, beginning in the year 1949, and for four additional years thereafter, exceed the levy of fifty cents on the one hundred dollar valuation fixed by Section 119 of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943, by levying one and four-tenths mills on the dollar valuation of all tangible property in Cass County, Nebraska for construction, repair and maintenance of roads, and one and six-tenths mills on the dollar valuation of all tangible property in Cass County, Nebraska for the construction, maintenance and repair of bridges, all in addition to the levy authorized by law for county purposes and in addition to the legal limits, provided, however, the total levy for bridge purposes shall not exceed one and six-tenths mills and the total levy for county road purposes shall not exceed one and seven-tenths mills, including the levies herein authorized.

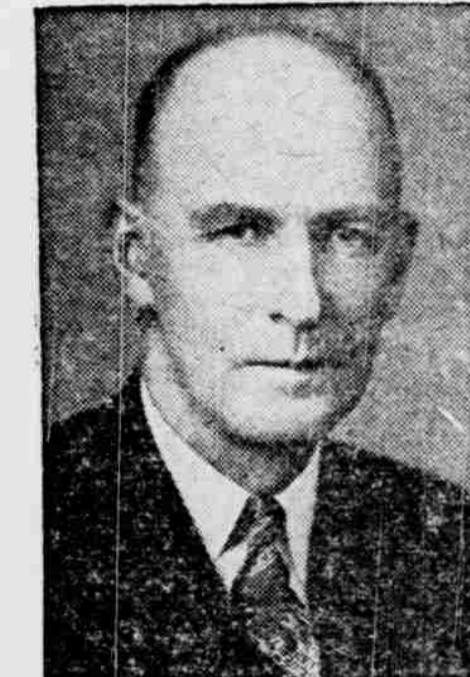
