

They hauled down the flag of Tripoli and replaced it with the Stars and Stripes,

the first time this nation's flag had flown in the old war. Here the Marines added the red stripe to their uniform in honor of their fallen comrades.

In the war with Mexico in 1845, the Marines participated with the army in the capture of Chapultepec castle, though impregnable. In the bloody fighting the Marine units won their objective and were in the halls of the Montezumas


