

**PHOTOGRAPHER ACHIEVES PICTURES UNDER WATER**  
COULEE DAM, Wash. (AP)—A photographer has taken successful pictures of the spillway base of Grand Coulee Dam here with an experimental underwater camera.  
Harold Maiken made the pictures 70 feet below the surface of the Columbia River. The photographers were taken to deter-

mine needs for repairs. Maiken said the camera can take 40 pictures and is adjustable for depths and water conditions. It is complete with batteries and flash bulbs and is enclosed in a steel box.
