QUICK CURRIED TUNA—mix can of condensed cream of mushroom soup, 1/2 c. milk, teaspoon curry powder with can of flaked tuna. Heat, serve on buttered toast for 4.

RECIPE

POTATO CREAM

4 c. grated raw potatoes 1 1/2 c. coffee cream
1 c. ground raw onion 3/4 c. grated cheese
salt and pepper to taste

Place grated raw potatoes in fine sieve. Rinse with cold water, drain thoroughly. Mix with raw onion, add salt and pepper to taste. Put in greased casserole, pour cream over top. Sprinkle with grated American cheese. Cover casserole, bake in moderate oven (350°) about 45 mins. Remove cover, bake about 15 mins. longer or until cheese browns. Serves 6.
