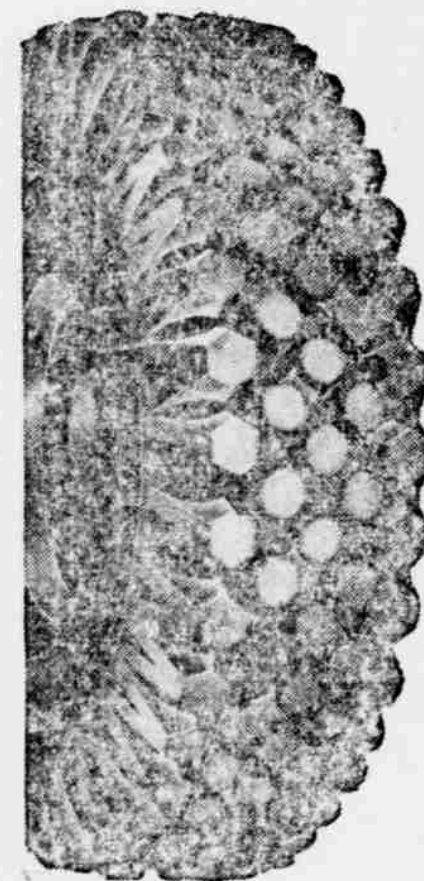

History Hard? Not Any More!

At least that is what the pupils in the upper rooms at St. John's school are saying since Msgr. George Agius procured the set of Comprehensive Social Study maps of the United States for them.

The maps, edited by Olin D. Morrison of Ohio University and Erwin Raisz of Harvard University, cover the backgrounds of European early civilization, Roman World and Medieval periods as a preliminary to the maps of various trips of exploration and settlement. All the periods of the United States are shown very clearly in regard to expansion, settlement, population trends and the like.

Only a few weeks ago the latest map was added to the set showing the latest developments in Europe since the second world war. The latest devices of modern map making science have been used in this set to make them easily comprehended and long remembered. They are mounted on a stand for easy access and each map is bound by a strong cloth tape which should extend their use for many years.

According to Sister Rose Emma, principal, the maps are a very popular aid to the students and according to one of the students, "they are out of this world."

Clarence E. Pool, 70, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William H. Pool, was born July 18, 1878, at Eight Mile Grove, in Cass county. After a two weeks illness he passed away at a Lincoln hospital, Thursday, January 20, 1949. Mr. Pool moved with his parents to a farm near Wabash, where he spent his young manhood. He was married to Miss Mary Lueta Colbert, December 24, 1899. Since 1916 they have lived on a farm adjoining Weeping Water on the north.

Mr. Pool was an active member of the Congregational church and seldom missed a church service. For several years he was one of the deacons of the church. He was also a member of Euclid Masonic lodge, where he served as Master, and he was a worthy patron of the Elizabeth Chapter of the Eastern Star.

He leaves his wife, Mary Lueta, and two daughters, Eloise Pool, who is an instructor in mathematics at the University of Nebraska, and Hazel Pool, who is with the Lincoln public school system. Also two brothers, Dr. Raymond J. Pool, of the Botany department of the State University, and Albert Pool, who is a farmer near Wabash; a great many cousins, nieces and nephews, other relatives and friends.
