Obituary of Elmwood Pioneer, H. F. Oehlerking

A large crowd attended funeral services of Henry Oehlerking on Thursday afternoon at the Evangelical United Brethren church at Elmwood. Floral decorations were varied and beautiful. Music was furnished by Mrs. Orval Kuehn who played the instrumental numbers, and a men's quartette from Callahan church. Singers were Reuben Stock, Veron Rikli, Warren Rikli and Donald Rikli, with Mrs. Reuben Stock accompanying. They sang "Face to Face," "Lead Me Gently Home" and "The Old Rugged Cross."

The pastor, Rev. E. F. Halst had charge of the services, assisted by the District Superintendent, Rev. W. G. Remboldt, of Lincoln. The pastor used as his text parts of the first chapter of John, verses 36 to 39. He especially emphasized the invitation "Come and see" and commended the life of the deceased and his response to this call. He mentioned the fact that he never wore a smile as he greeted his friends.
