The winter in the east was very mild, Mrs. Hetrick reports, only having seen two heavy snow storms and very little ice. Pennsylvania has very beautiful mountain drives, which are very pretty in the spring and summer.

Most of the houses are double or duplex and built close to the sidewalks, so the yards are very small. In Pennsylvania the mines are only working three days a week because of surplus stock piles. In Illinois she visited with old friends and relatives in Chicago, Joliet, Decatur and other places.

heard in Otoe county and the jury term will open in Sarpy in a short time and this will make the jury in Cass county later in being called.

In the district court Saturday morning Judge Thomas E. Dunbar held a hearing on the motion of defendant in the case of C. B. Wilson and C. D. Wilson vs. New Market Oil Co., vs. Allen Ehlers, et al. Hearing was concluded and the court being fully advised in the matter, sustains the same. Plaintiff given leave to file amended petition and defendants given ten days to answer.

In the case of Idelle Holman, et al., vs. Peter Klevitt Sons' Inc. the motion of the plaintiff for a new trial was overruled. This is a suit to set aside deed and quiet title and on the trial of the case the court had found for the defendants.
