The best way to prepare for a happy life is to begin early. An important "first" is a yearly check-up by your doctor. A damage to health that is discovered early is always easier to correct. Prevention is better than cure.

The principal foes of health that confront us in middle life are heart disease, cancer, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, apoplexy, diabetes and arthritis.

Heart disease leads the list as the cause of death. It accounts for twice as many deaths as cancer. But heart diseases do respond to care, and the person with a heart difficulty should know his limitations and not exceed them.

Diabetes is sometimes known as the "sugar disease." Diabetes is a condition in which the body cannot use sugar. The cause seems to be centered in the pancreas. Signs of diabetes are increased thirst and appetite, loss of weight, a dry skin, weakness, pains in the legs and a general nervous irritability. Now the use of insulin, according to the physician's orders, has made possible a normal life for those with diabetes.
