

In the district court of Otoe county an action has been filed by Charles G. Babian, of this major operation at the Imman- city, against Repp H. Wilson, of Nebraska City. The petition of the sum of \$4,272.50.

The suit arises from an automobile collision a mile north of Nebraska City on U. S. Highway No. 75 on February 3. It is charged by the plaintiff that the defendant was driving on the wrong side of the highway at the time of the accident. The cars had crashed almost headon. It is claimed by Mr. Babian that he suffered a broken collar bone, concussion and lacerations and
