AN ORDINANCE CREATING STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER 99 IN THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA. DEFINING ITS BOUNDARIES AND PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF A CERTAIN STREET BY PAVING, AND SUCH OTHER WORK AS MAY BE INCIDENTAL THERETO.
BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska: Section 1. The Mayor and

Council of the City of Plattsmouth, in the County of Cass, State of Nebraska, hereby find and determine that the street hereinafter ordered to be improved is a main thoroughfare that forms a part of the State Highway System.
Section 2. There is hereby created within the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, a Street Improvement District to be known and designated as Street Improvement District Number 99, the outer boundaries of which are as follows:
Beginning at the intersection of a line 140 feet northwest of and parallel to the northwest property line of Chicago Avenue with the south property line of First Avenue, also known as Pearl Street; thence east along the south property line of 1st Avenue, also known as Pearl Street, to its intersection with a line 140 feet southeast of and parallel to the southwest property line of Chicago Avenue; thence in a southwesterly direction along said line 140 feet southeast of and parallel to the southeast property line of Chicago Avenue to its intersection with the south property line of Holdrege Street; thence west along the south property line of Holdrege Street to its intersection with a line 140 feet northwest of and parallel to the northwest property line of Chicago Avenue; thence in a northeasterly direction along said line 140 feet northwest of and parallel to the northwest property line of Chicago Avenue to the point of beginning.
Section 3. The following street within said Street Improvement District shall be and hereby is ordered improved by paving, to wit:
CHICAGO AVENUE from the south property line of 1st Avenue, also known as Pearl Street, to the south property line of Holdrege Street, together with all included intersections.
All work essential for or necessarily incidental to the construction of said improvements shall be done in connection therewith as a part thereof.
Section 4. All of said improvements shall be constructed to the established grades as fixed by ordinance of said City, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications to be made by H. H. Henningson, Special Engineer employed by the City, and to be approved by the Council. Said improvements shall be made at public cost but special assessments on the specially benefited property may be levied to reimburse the City to the extent provided by law.
