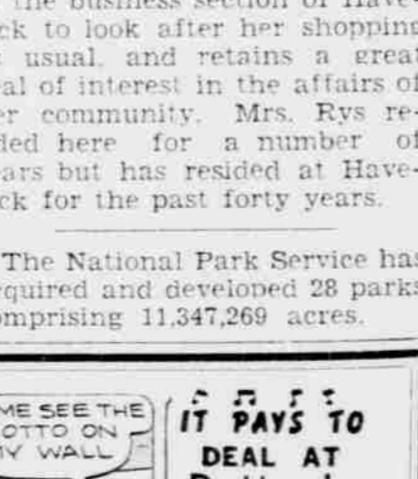
Mr. Gradoville is with the sugar section of the department of commerce at Washington, being connected with the production and marketing section of the department.
