Hinky-Dinky's "Recipe-of-the-Week" Frosted Chocolate Drop COOKIES

½ cup Food Club shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs, beaten
3 squares (3 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
½ cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
¾ cup chopped walnut meats
¾ cup seedless raisins
1½ cups sifted cake flour
1½ teaspoons baking powder
1½ teaspoon salt
Cream shortening; add sugar gradually while creaming. Beat eggs; add. Melt chocolate over hot water; add. Add milk, vanilla, walnut meats and raisins; mix well. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt; add. Drop by teaspoons on greased cookie sheets. Bake in moderate oven. 375 degrees F. 12-15 minutes. Makes about 60 cookies.
If desired, frost cookies with confectioner's sugar. (xxxx) frosting, tinted with food coloring, and decorate with nutmeats, colored candy sprinkles, etc.
