

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Office of County Commissioners of Cass County Plattsmouth, Nebraska, October 18, 1949.

Board met pursuant to adjournment: Present, Parr Young, Alva G. Reid and W. F. Nolte, County Commissioners and Geo. R. Sayles, County Clerk.

Minutes of the last session approved, when the following business was transacted in regular form:

Resignation of H. L. Bornemeier, Commissioner for the Third District, was accepted by

the Board.
County Treasurer, Ruth Patton, County Attorney Walter H. Smith, and County Clerk, Geo. R. Sayles filed a Notice with the Board that Alva G. Reid of Elmwood, Nebraska had been appointed County Commissioner for the Third District to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Commissioner H. L. Bornemeier.

Official Bond of Alva G. Reid, in the Amount of \$1000.00, in favor of Cass County, Nebraska for the unexpired term of former County Commissioner, H. L. Bornemeier, was filed in the office of the County Judge and duly approved by the County Judge, Richard C. Peck, who also administered the Oath of Office and swore in the new Commissioner for the Third District.

Motion by Commissioner W. F. Nolte that Commissioner Alva G. Reid be appointed as Vice-Chairman of the Board, seconded by Commissioner Parr Young, and carried.

All Bids received will be publicly opened and read aloud in the County Commissioners office at the Court House at Plattsmouth, Nebraska on October 31, 1949 at 2:00 O'clock P. M.

All proposals shall be accompanied by a certified check drawn on a solvent Nebraska Bank in the amount of \$2000.00 made payable to the County Treasurer, Cass County, Nebraska, which check may be cashed and the proceeds retained as liquidated damages in case the successful bidder fails to enter into a contract and furnish a \$10,000.00 bond within 10 days from the date of the award of the contract to him.

All proposals shall be on the forms furnished by the County Highway Commissioner of Cass County, Nebraska, sealed and plainly marked "Proposal for Furnishing Lumber and Piling," and the name and address of the bidder shall be plainly marked on the outside of the envelope containing said proposal.

No bids shall be withdrawn after the opening of bids without the consent of the Board of County Commissioners. The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
