



OUR PARTING SHOT, SUH! . . . The Civil War is officially ended. The last of the three 105-pound projectiles uncovered still alive by mine detector crews is detonated at Fort Sumter at Charleston, S. C. The Confederate shells were fired into the fort in Charleston bay 88 years ago to set off the war between the states. The blasts, which sent up a tower of sand and smoke on the sandy beach outside the fort, were billed as "the last shots of the Civil War." 




