would keep only a few months. The equipment, installed in two rooms of the cave capable of handling about 18 carloads of powdered eggs, may help to provide a way to store this powder

The eggs are being purchased in performance of its requirement under parity regulations to keep the price bolstered.

Case said the demand from foreign countries for dried eggs had fallen off. Dried eggs now are shipped from the natural cooler to repackaging plants for .cream. Add this to the eggs as you use in such government projects as the hot school lunch program and for use by institutions.

"The cooler has been taking in as many eggs as it has been shipping," Case said.

Dried eggs are stored in wooden barrels in amounts ranging from 150 to 200 pounds. The cooler now is in charge of the CCC and is operated by the production and marketing administration of the Department of Agriculture.

Case said the cooler was within 30 cars of its capacity with 66,000,000 pounds of foodstuffs
