 stroy the bill in the interest of large interests, their chief opposition being that the bill sought the removal of the middle-men from the farm picture. The bill would arrive at the cost price of products on the market, that of the purchase price security offered by the Brannan plan, and from these would be based the price to the consumer. It being claimed that this would reduce the prices to the consumer. The adoption of the bill would eliminate losses occasioned by government purchases of crops that were later thrown away at a loss.

On the matter of the excise taxes, the congressman stated that under the legislation in force at this time, that these taxes would have expired two years after the close of the hostilities, but the 80th congress had passed a law that made the taxes permanent even when the President had opposed the tax

and had overridden his veto. Now they proposed to repeal the law, that would then increase the federal deficit.

The speaker spent some time on the matter of socialized medicine, claiming that the public health bill did not propose a socialized building of the health condition of the nation. The health of the nation was necessary for the progress of the people, and their welfare. The bill was for public health improvement, especially to the more unfortunate classes of people. Under the plan, the sick might have what physician they desired, not being forced to accept a state paid agent as their physician, but would be free to use their own desires in the matter of who was to care for them. He told of the experiences of congressmen and congresswomen that had visited England and their reaction to the conditions that they found there, where the nation was weakened by effects of the war and the despair that was generally shown as well as the mental unrest of the people.

Mr. O'Sullivan paid a compliment to Senator Butler and Congressman Karl Stefan, as being of the broader minded republicans that really had the interest of the people at heart.

The speaker urged the repeal of the Taft-Hartley bill and a new bill passed rather than trying to patch up the original measure. He secured southern opposition to the bill as one that would tend to create forced labor.
