Support Urged For Christmas Seal Campaign

Those who have forgotten or postponed acknowledgment of their 1949 Christmas seals are urged to do so in an appeal made this week by Dr. J. Harry Murphy, of Omaha, president of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, sponsor of the 42nd annual Seal Sale.

"It's true that we are accustomed to using Seals on packages and letters during the Christmas season," he said, "but the money received for them is used for tuberculosis control the year round, no matter what the season. It is definitely not too late to pay for the Seals because the work of tuberculosis prevention and control which they will finance for the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association will continue through the 12 months of 1950.

"Some people may have unintentionally mislaid their Seals or may have overlooked making their returns in the rush of the holiday preparations. We are happy to report that payments for Seals are coming in daily, but we can use many more dollars in contributions throughout the state."

Emphasizing that the association depends entirely on Seal Sale funds to finance its program for the coming year, Doctor Murphy explained that 95 per cent of all funds received here in Nebraska, stay in the state. Only 5 per cent of the money received goes to the national headquarters, this to be used for educational and research work.

Doctor Murphy added, the thanks of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association and all its affiliated Christmas Seal Committees in the state for the fine work done by many volunteers in putting over the 1949 Christmas Seal Sale.

Class 4-H Poultry Team Wins Ak-Sar-Ben Contest

In the 4-H and F. F. A. Poultry judging contest held at the Ak-Sar-Ben Poultry Congress, the Cass County team won the first place trophy. Eleven teams were entered with 39 boys and girls from Nebraska and Iowa competing.

The Cass team scored a total of 1569 points out of a possible 1875 points. Members of the team were Jack Norris, Weeping Water; James Pollard and Jimmie Baller, of Nehawka. Alternates were John Norris, of Weeping Water, and Tommy Johnson, of Nehawka. The team was coached by local 4-H club leaders, Mrs. Hall Pollard, of Nehawka, and Clarence Norris, of Weeping Water.

Jack Norris, High Individual Judge

Jack Norris, was high individual judge scoring 564 points out of a possible 625. He therefore was awarded two beautiful trophies. James Pollard was the 7th place winner as individual judge.

The team trophy is a permanent possession of Cass County and is on display at the County Extension office. It will be added to the collection of 4-H trophies won by 4-H'ers in past years.

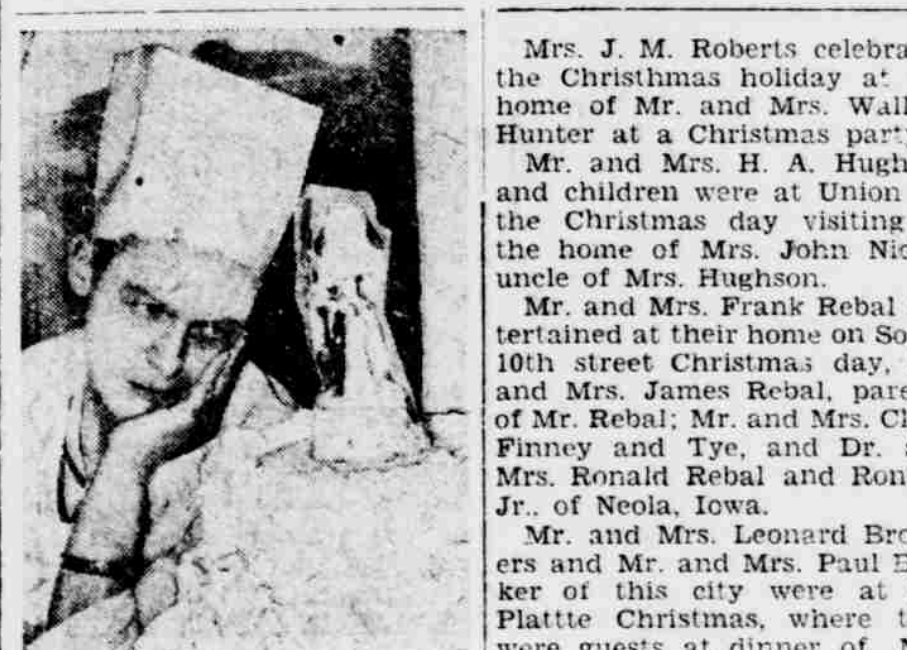

C. R. O. P. Program Raises \$45,000
The 1949 Christian Rural Overseas Program has raised \$45,000 so far, Dwight Dell, CROP chairman reported.

Dell announced these figures at a meeting of the CROP state committee Friday in Lincoln.

"We have almost complete reports from 18 Nebraska counties, and partial reports from 13 more," Dell said, "and CROP volunteers have already collected the equivalent of 31 cars in commodities and money. These donations will be turned over to Catholic, Lutheran and other Protestant agencies for distribution to the needy overseas."

Seven cars are already on their way overseas." The Committee made plans for the dedication of the 1949 Nebraska Friendship Food Train. This year the train itself will not be dedicated. Instead, a miniature, symbolic train will be exhibited in the main rotunda of the State Capitol Building in Lincoln. A car will be added to this symbolic train every time a car is shipped from a Nebraska county. The dedication will be held at the Capitol on December 30.
