**Obituary**

Leo Leslie Horton was born at Cold Water, Wis., on Sept. 9, 1864, and passed away Dec. 29, at the home of her daughter in Coffeyville, Kansas, his age being 85 years and four months. Pneumonia was the immediate cause of his death.

At the age of twelve with his parents he came to Nebraska in an ox team wagon. They settled near Elmwood and he has lived in this community with the exception of three years in Colorado and five years in Harlan county in western Nebraska. Also the last few winters he has been in Kansas.

At an early age he united with the Christian church. For some years he was an Elmwood business man.

He was the oldest of five children. He is survived by his brother, Everett, and sisters, Zada, Myra, and Ethel and their families all of whom live on the west coast in Washing-

ton and California. Other survivors are his son, Earl, and daughter, Mrs. Fred Rothrock (Mabel) of Coffeyville, Kansas, and three granddaughters. His wife, Eva Puddy Horton, died in 1915, and his son, Lyle, died in 1943. There are three granddaughters, Mrs. Lois Frances of Lincoln, Mrs. Orville Julian (Marjory) of Elmwood, and Mrs. Leila Wendt of Murdock.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church on Saturday afternoon, the pastor Rev. Elby Boosinger, was in charge. Miss Marlene Eidenmiller played the instrumental music, and Mrs. Mary Linhart sang "Sometime We'll Understand" and "Going Down the Valley".
