DERSECUTION served to scatter The disciples abroad and spread the Gospel farther. Stephen journeved as far as Phoenicia, Cyprus, and Antioch, speaking only to Jews. Some who came from Cyprus and Cyrene spoke also to Greeks.

A great number believed and "turned unto the Lord." When report of this reached the Jerusalem church, Barnabas, "full of the Holy Spirit," was sent to Antioch. When he had seen the work of grace there, he went to Tarsus for Paul, and brought him to Antioch.

In Acts 13: 1, we learn the names of the prophets and teachers who labored with Barnabas and Paul. In their ministry and fasting, they were lead to set apart Barnabas and Paul for missionary work. Laying their hands on the two men, they sent them away on the first missionary journey. The growth in grace and the missionary spirit of the church at Antioch made it fitting that in this church "the disciples were first called Christians." 




