

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Office of County Commissioners, Cass County, Plattsmouth, Nebr.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present: Parr Young, A. G. Reid and W. F. Nolte, County Commissioners, and Geo. R. Sayles, County Clerk.

Minutes of last session approved, when the following business was transacted in regular form:

The petition for the vacation of part of old road in the SE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 19 Township 10, Range 13, East of the 6th P. M. in Cass County, Nebraska, was presented to the County Board by the County Clerk. It appeared that all of the provisions of the Statutes of Nebraska relative to the same have been complied with; it was moved by Commissioner W. F. Nolte and seconded by Commissioner Parr Young that the said described road is hereby declared vacated by the Board of Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska. Carried.

The petition for the vacation of the road commencing at the Northwest corner of Section 32, Township 12, Range 10, East of the 6th P. M. in Cass County, Nebraska, and ending at the NE corner of said Section was presented to the County Board of Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, by the County Clerk. It appearing that all of the provisions of the Statutes of Nebraska had been complied with; it was moved by Commissioner A. G. Reid and seconded by Commissioner W. F. Nolte that the said described road is hereby declared vacated by the Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska. Carried.

FEEDING GOOD COWS PAYS

PAPILLION—It doesn't cost much more to feed good milk cows than poor cows, according to the annual report of the Douglas-Sarpy Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

The high herd in the association last year produced an average of 14,939 pounds of milk and 522 pounds of butterfat per cow. The feed cost per animal for this herd was \$178 and the returns above feed cost averaged \$399.

The low producing herd in the

association gave an average of 4,862 pounds of milk and 246 pounds of butterfat. The feed cost per cow for this herd was \$105 and there was an average return above feed costs of \$144. This means that it cost \$73 more per cow to feed the high producing herd but the returns amounted to \$255 more per cow.

The average production of all cows in the association was 9,253 pounds of milk and 367 pounds of butterfat. The feed cost amounted to about \$163 per cow. The cost was divided equally between roughage and grain.
